## **HISTORY IN THE MAKING Barry Hayes** Medallion of Honor

Barry Hayes, former Mayor of the Town of Granite Falls, received the Medallion of Honor during a regular meeting of the Caldwell County Board of Commissioners on Monday, April 11, 2022. The proclamation noted his 42 years of service to the Town of Granite Falls (4 years on the Planning Board and Recreation Advisory Board), 14 years on the town council (including 6 as Mayor pro tem), and 24 years as mayor. During his tenure, the town received numerous awards, attracted new industry, experienced



both private and commercial development, and expanded town services (such as recreation). In addition to his duties as mayor, Hayes

served on the board of numerous civic organizations (e.g., Hospice, South Caldwell Christian Ministries, Gideons International, South Caldwell Boosters, Crime Stoppers, and Communities in Schools).

## **HISTORY IN THE MAKING** Saying "Good-Bye" to COVID-19

COVID-19 has been the unwanted visitor who keeps lingering at the door on the way out. In our community and state, there is a general optimism. Life has begun to look more normal with fewer masks being worn, more group gatherings being held, more church choirs singing, and more hugs being given. Yet, at the same time, medical and government authorities on the federal level have sent mixed signals by warning about future variants and being inconsistent with policies.

On One Hand, It was Good: On February 15th, the TSA (Transportation Security Administration) ended its mask mandates for school buses.

On the Other, It was Wait and See: On Thursday, April 13th, the Transportation Safety Administration extended the mask mandate for public transportation by fifteen (15) days - until May 3, 2022 - due to a small increase in cases caused by the BA.2 omicron subvariant. On

April 18th, U. S. District Judge Kathryn Kimball Mizelle from Florida ruled that the CDC's mask mandate for public transportation exceeded its authority. That same day, the CDC posted an announcement on its website that the mask mandate was no longer in effect. However, on April 20th, the US Department of Justice announced it was appealing the ruling.

Take a Breath: On Friday, April 14th, the U. S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) gave emergency approval for the InspectIR COVID-19 Breathalyzer, a diagnostic test that detects SARS-CoV-2 (the scientific name for COVID-19) in less than three (3) minutes. According to the FDA news release, the test correctly identified 91.2% of the positive samples and 99.3% of the negative samples. InspectIR expects to produce 100 instruments per week with the capacity to perform 160 tests per day each.

The new COVID breathalyzer is intended for use in healthcare settings such as a doctor's office, hospital, or mobile testing site. Although the equipment is about the size of a suitcase, and, thus, portable, it requires administration by trained operators working under the supervision of licensed healthcare providers. Since results are not 100% accurate, positive tests must be confirmed with a molecular test.

## GRANITE FALLS HISTORICAL ASSOCIATION Update

Members of the Granite Falls Historical Association met at 7 p.m. on Tuesday, April 26, 2022 in the Granite Falls History and Transportation Museum. The meeting began with a program by Carl Becker, a local resident who displayed items he found on the grounds of the museum with his metal

detector. The once lost treasures include a ring with markings that indicate it could have been the property of Andrew Baird, the original owner of the building. Born in Scotland on July 18, 1762, Baird applied for a land grant to set up an iron forge on Gunpowder Creek in 1792.

In honor of his 260th birthday, the Granite Falls History Committee will host a birthday party at the museum on Sunday, July 17, 2022 from 2 until 4 p.m. There will be a display of items Carl has found around town, and he plans to be there to speak with persons interested in his work. The History Committee invites the public to attend.



During the business session that followed the program, GFHA members decided that the tea party planned for May 21st would be a "practice and learn" event so they could taste test recipes, review British tea party protocol, and make sure they were ready to provide a special occasion for paying guests.

In other business, members learned that persons recruited to map Pinecrest Cemetery before COVID struck are no longer able to assist with this project. Trustees will meet on Tuesday, May 17th at 2:45 p.m. in the museum to make new plans. They will also discuss sprucing up the Baird Family Cemetery. They invite persons who are interested in these projects to join them.

The Granite Tablet is a publication of the Granite Falls History Committee, which manages the Granite Falls History and Transportation Museum. The museum is located in the historic home of Andrew Baird, an early settler. The building is the second oldest residence in Caldwell County. The Baird House was built around 1795 with additions made over the next hundred years. The house remained a residence until 2001 when the owner sought permission to have it burned down due to the high cost of maintenance. Recognizing the historical significance of the building, the Town of Granite Falls purchased the home with the intentions of turning it into a museum. With the help of a grant from the North Carolina Department of Transportation and hours of hard work by dedicated people, the vision became a reality.
