

NEWS FROM GRANITE FALLS Incumbents Win Re-Election

Continuity and fresh ideas will guide Granite Falls forward as three seasoned Town Council members were sworn in for new terms at the Town of Granite Falls December Town Council meeting. Tracy Townsend and Mike Mackie, each securing their fifth terms, and Jim Mackie, elected for a fourth term, will continue their dedication to the Town's growth and well-being. Mayor Caryl B. Burns administered the oath of office on Monday, December 4, 2023, marking the start

BE A MODERN DAY ANDREW BAIRD Own All of Granite Falls

On December 11, 1792, Andrew Baird began the process of acquiring land that now makes up all of Granite Falls, part of Grace Chapel, and part of Rhodhiss. A village grew up around his iron forge on Gunpowder Creek. Eventually, he began selling land to newcomers, and his family sold the rest after his death. On May 1, 1899, Mr. Baird's successors established the Town of Granite Falls.

Just in time for our 125th anniversary, Late for the Sky in Cincinnati, Ohio has produced Granite Falls... Opoly. The game, which is similar to Monopoly, allows players to buy land and collect rent, but they have to watch out for property taxes, traffic jams, and the IRS. The Granite Falls History and Transportation Museum is open on Sundays (except designated holidays) from 2 until 4 p.m. The public is welcome. Admission is free.

The Town of Granite Falls is accepting applications from volunteers who are willing to serve as museum guides. The work requires being available to serve one two-hour shift each quarter. Guides open/close the museum and share information about the town's history. Applicants receive onthe-job training with an experienced guide and a handbook for easy reference. Persons wishing to volunteer should call the Town Office at (828) 396-3131. Due to a shortage of guides, the museum is only open on Sunday afternoons. The History Committee would like to recruit enough people to open on both Saturday and Sunday.

The History Committee also offers private tours upon request. To arrange one, call the town office at (828) 396-3131. The museum is a great field trip for churches, schools, day care centers, civic clubs, and families. There is no charge for admission, and we don't ask for donations. However, we keep a donation box on the counter for persons who wish to contribute toward the upkeep of the facilities. We also have new copies of *Etched in Granite*, the History of Granite Falls, North Carolina for sale at \$25.00 each.



in Granite Falls for \$19.98 plus tax.

Please be aware that there are some minor details that keep the game from being historically, economically, and geographically accurate. Nonetheless, the game is a great tribute to a great town. Play it for fun, not for factual information. The editor of this newsletter was curious about the game - why Granite Falls was chosen and how they gathered information, so she contacted the manufacturer by email. The Granite Tablet is a publication of the Granite Falls History Committee, which manages the Granite Falls History and Transportation Museum. The museum is located in the historic home of Andrew Baird, an early settler. The building is the second oldest residence in Caldwell County. The Baird House was built around 1795 with additions made over the next hundred years. The house remained a residence until 2001 when the owner sought permission to have it burned down due to the high cost of maintenance. Recognizing the historical significance of the building, the Town of Granite Falls purchased the home with the intentions of turning it into a museum. With the help of a grant from the North Carolina Department of Transportation and hours of hard work by dedicated people, the vision became a reality. The Granite Falls History and Transportation Museum held its grand opening and ribbon cutting on February18, 2007. Visit us on Facebook under "Granite Falls History and Transportation Museum."
