MAKING HISTORY COVID-19

Although COVID-19 cases saw a downward trend into the spring and early summer, they started climbing shortly after the Fourth of July. News casts reported that the new cases were primarily caused by the new Delta variant and usually involved persons who were not vaccinated. Although the number of cases increased, Governor Roy Cooper announced on Thursday, July 22, 2021, that he planned to allow the mask mandate to lapse on July 30, 2021. He noted, however, that he would retain the emergency powers he assumed in March 2020.

He also recommended, but did not require, that everyone, regardless of vaccination status, wear a mask in schools serving grades K-8. On the previous day, he and Dr. Mandy Cohen, the NC Secretary of Health and Human Services, released an updated toolkit for schools calling for universal masks in K-8 and masks for all other grades unless completely vaccinated. The governor said he would allow local school districts to make their own decisions about masks.

On Thursday, July 29th, Gov. Cooper and Dr. Cohen held another news conference to address the continuing increase in COVID-19 cases. While the governor said he would still allow the mask mandate to lapse on July 30th at 5 p.m., he ordered that all employees in the governor's office and in cabinet agencies be vaccinated or wear masks and undergo weekly testing for COVID-19. He encouraged other employers to do the same. He also urged vaccinated persons to wear masks indoors in areas where the

TOWN OF GRANITE FALLS NEWS Changes at the Police Department

On July 1, 2021, Caldwell County dispatchers began answering routine phone calls for the Granite Falls Police Department on the weekends and between 5 p.m. and 8 a.m. on weekdays. There will be a dispatcher on site in Granite Falls Monday - Friday between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. to assist with needs that must be handled at the police department. Phone calls about problems with utilities should be made to the town office, which is now being monitored 24/7. Setting up the 24/7 phone number and contracting dispatching services to the county frees up funds to put more police officers out in the community and on patrol. Here are the numbers to call:

Caldwell County Schools: The Board of Education held a special called meeting on Monday, July 26, 2021 to discuss back to school plans. Members voted unanimously to make wearing masks optional for both students and staff, but reserved the right to make changes as need. Dr. Don Phipps, the school superintendent, noted that he intended to work with local health officials to ensure the system followed the best practices for our area.

When school begins in Caldwell County on August 23rd, students will return to the regular five day per week schedule (Monday - Friday). There will be no general temperature checks or COVID questionnaires. However, persons should not be at school if they have COVID-19 symptoms. Schools will continue to follow cleaning, social distancing, and quarantine protocols.

The Work of the Town: Despite the pandemic, local officials, town residents, and persons living within the ETJ (extraterritorial jurisdiction) have worked long hours during the past year with Western Piedmont Council of Governments to study the town and the people living here in order to make recommendations for potential economic development, transportation, land use, and other needs that will arise in the future. They presented their findings during a drop by public meeting held at the William B. Shuford Recreation Center on Wednesday, July 21, 2021 between 4 and 6:30 p.m. During the event, WPCOG representatives

Meanwhile, renovations are continuing on the 1935 building and the 1948 gym. These buildings will be updated to meet stricter building codes and to take advantage of modern technology. To complete the campus, there will be a multipurpose field on the corner of North Main Street Parallel and Park Avenue, and the modern addition to the junior high building will become a field house. Although the buildings from 1902, 1922, and 1950 are gone, we are continuing their legacy of providing the best learning environment for our youth, who will make <u>their own</u> memories and sing praises about <u>their own</u> school.
