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

TOWN OF GRANITE FALLS RECOGNIZES Shea Bolick 2023 Burroughs Wellcome North Carolina Northwest Teacher of the Year

The Town of Granite Falls recognized Shea Bolick, the 2023 Burroughs Wellcome North Carolina Northwest Teacher of the Year, during a meeting of the Granite Falls Town Council on Monday, July 17, 2023 in the Town Council Chambers on South Main Street. Dr. Caryl B. Burns, Mayor of Granite Falls, presented Mrs. Bolick with a gift from the town and a certificate which recognized her commitment and dedication to students in Caldwell County Schools for the past twenty-two years. Mrs. Bolick teaches Spanish at South Caldwell High School. In addition to her duties as a teacher, the award recipient is an active member of Granite Falls First United Methodist Church, where she heads the food ministry and volunteers on the mission field in Costa Rica. She lives in Granite Falls with her husband, Ritch, who is a member of the town council.



TOWN OF GRANITE FALLS Splash Pad

During its business session on July 17, the Granite Falls Town Council awarded contracts for the construction of a splash pad on the campus of the William B. Shuford Recreation Center. The funding will come from a Parks and Recreation Trust Fund (PARTF) Grant awarded to the town in 2020. The planning, engineering and designing process began almost immediately.

Following the advice of McGill & Associates, the town chose three (3) businesses to provide materials and services. Lail Builders of Hickory

will prepare the site; Vortex Aquatic Structures, International of Dover, Delaware will provide the equipment and features; and Aqua Underground of Marietta, Ga. will install the splash pad. The projected completion date is May 2024. A panoramic view of the proposed design is currently on Facebook under "Granite Falls Parks & Recreation Department."

ADA Improvements

The Granite Falls Town Council also voted to award two (2) additional contracts to Lail Builders. One will be for an ADA (American Disabilities Act) walking path and the other for two (2) ADA restrooms in the Pool House at the Recreation Center. These improvements will allow more people to safely enjoy recreational activities provided by the town.



More News from Parks & Recreation

Swimming: The pool is scheduled to be open daily through Sunday, August 13. However, the daily occupancy may change based upon the availability of lifeguards. According to national media, there has been a shortage of lifeguards this summer, forcing pools across the country to change their schedules. Granite Falls is no exception. To find the updated schedule for the William B. Shuford Recreation Center, check the Granite Falls Parks & Recreation Facebook page.

Soccer: Youth (ages 4 –13) may register for co-ed soccer for the fall season from Monday, July 31 until Monday, August 21. The fee, which includes uniforms, is \$40.00 for residents and \$65.00 for non-residents.

Basketball: Youth (ages 4 -13) may register for co-ed basketball between Monday, October 16 and Monday November 6. The fee, including uniform, is \$40.00 for residents and \$65.00 for non-residents.

Other Recreation Activities: The William B. Shuford Recreation Center also has tennis courts, a walking trail with exercise stations, fitness rooms, meeting rooms, and a playground for children. From time to time, private citizens offer exercise programs and art classes.

Lakeside Park (aka "Tater Hole") offers three fishing decks (one is ADA accessible), walking/hiking trails, and a picnic shelter with restrooms. Neighborhood Park (corner of Chestnut Street and Sterling Avenue) offers a tennis court and a playground.

Important Messages from Public Works

Water: To ensure the delivery of high quality water, town employees will flush the water system on Thursday, August 2 and Friday, August 3. This process may cause temporary low pressure and/or discolored water. If your water appears discolored, run a cold water faucet until it clears up.

Sewer: Do not flush grease, wipes (even those marked "flushable" have fine print disclaimers), diapers, paper towels, etc. down the drain because they can cause damage and backups in the sewer system.

Yard Waste: Bag grass clippings, weeds, plant trimmings, etc. and leave them at the curb on Thursday mornings for pickup. Filled bags should weigh 50 pounds or less. Do not blow grass into the streets and gutters. Not only can they pollute our water source, but grass blown into the roadway can cause motorcycle accidents. Also, do not block sidewalks with garbage, bagged lawn debris, and/or limbs. The ends of limbs should face the roadway so workers can grab them quickly and insert them into the chipper.

Dateline: Granite Falls, N. C. 1992 - 1998

From Etched in Granite, the History of Granite Falls, North Carolina by Maxine McCall

- In November 1994, the town council set up a Town Steering Committee for the purpose of creating a sense of community, encouraging volunteerism, and instilling pride.
- In 1995, the fire department acquired a 1,250 GPM Custom Becker pumper with a seven man cab that was powered by a 300 horsepower Cummins Diesel. The town paid \$185,460.00 for it.
- On May 9, 1996, international cyclists on the "Tour DuPont" raced through Granite Falls enroute to Charlotte.
- On December 1, 1997, A. W. (Bert) Huffman, Jr. completed 26 years as Mayor of Granite Falls. He had served one year on the town council before running for mayor. He decided not to seek re-election in 1997 and was succeeded by Barry Hayes.
- In October 1998, children at Granite Falls Elementary School participated in a telethon sponsored by the television network, Nickelodeon. Their efforts won the school a visit from the "Big Help Mobile" on March 18, 1999.
- On December 31, 1998, the Town of Granite Falls began a year long celebration of its centennial anniversary.

Down Memory Lane with Wayne Bud Moore

Before the Civil War, there were only a few cotton mills in the South. After the Reconstruction Era, more mills began to appear throughout the South - especially along the Fall Line. Such was the situation in Caldwell and neighboring counties [in the North Carolina Foothills].

Almost every town had its "cotton mill hill" -simply put, "the mill hill." In Granite Falls there were three "mill hills." The houses were either three or four room houses with perhaps a small room for storage. There was electricity with a single wire for a light hanging in the middle of each room. There was no indoor plumbing, only a water tap between two houses to be shared with a neighbor. In the winter they would freeze and would have to be thawed. I helped my mother thaw ours on several occasions. The toilet was a building with two holes, set a certain distance from each house.

The work in the mills was easy to learn and sometimes employed whole families. As there were no child labor laws at that time, children as young as ten were employed. There were jobs for males and females. I have known many people who told me they went to work in the mill at a very early age.

The people who worked in the mills were an interesting bunch. Families moved from the mountain farms to town to find jobs in the cotton mill. Some of the workers were illiterate, while others had a little education and could read and write. Life was probably better for mill workers than their previous employment, which most likely was farming. Now they could work regular hours, have time for some recreation or other activities, walk to town to do their shopping, socialize with others and be closer to medical services.

Dateline: Granite Falls, N. C. Miscellaneous Dates

editor's notes: Here are some dates I inadvertently left out of past editions of *The Granite Tablet* and *Tablet II.*

- In 1941, the town built a water filter plant on Lake Rhodhiss with a capacity of 300,000 gallons of water per day. The plant, which cost \$50,000 to build, replaced the two wells the town had been using since it began providing water to the town in 1934.
- In 1960, the town issued a Water and Sewer Bond in the amount of \$125,000 to double the capacity of the water filtration plant (from 300,000 to 600,000 gallons per day).
- In 1965, the town board approved spending \$108,500 to improve the sewer system.
- In 1970, the town began putting fluoride in drinking water. An ARC Demonstration Project grant paid 80 percent of the costs for the first four (4) years. There were more upgrades to the water plant in the 1970s and in 1983.



• In June 1970, American Legion Post 209 presented a flag and flag pole to the fire department.

- In 1971, the town purchased a custom made 1971 American-LaFrance pumper with a 1500 GPM pumping capacity.
- In 1972, the town approved the issue of \$26,000 in bonds to extend and improve the water lines.
- In 1975, the Insurance Services Office (ISO) determined that the insurance rating should be lowered from Class 7 to Class 6 - good news for insurance costs.
