AT THE MUSEUM National Quilt Month

Members of the Granite Falls History Committee honored quilters with a grand opening reception on Sunday, March 2, 2025, from 2 until 4 p.m. The quilts remained on display through Sunday, March 30, 2025. The museum is open to the public on Sundays from 2 until 4 p.m. (except holidays) and at other times by appointment.

The Town of Granite Falls and the Caldwell Chamber of Commerce welcomed Dunkin' to town on Saturday, March 22, 2025, with a ribbon cutting at 11 a.m. Bryan Moore, Chamber CEO/President, emceed the event. Mayor Caryl Burns welcomed the business to town and introduced Town Manager Daniel Cobb, Councilman Martin Townsend, and Police Chief "Brine" Branham. The grand opening began at 5 a.m. with the first 100 customers receiving coupons for free coffee for a year. At 7 a.m., the restaurant began giving a free glazed donut with each beverage sold while supplies lasted. Customers could also spin a wheel to receive free prizes and take advantage of other specials throughout the day. The grand opening was broadcast on KICKS 103.3 FM.

After the ribbon cutting, Dennis Harvey, Dunkin' Franchisee, donated \$1,500.00 to the North Carolina Law Enforcement Torch Run for Special Olympics. Stepanie Wilkerson, Davidson County Athlete Ambassador, told about her experiences with Special Olympics and expressed appreciation for the generous contribution. Representatives from the N. C.
