Dining with the Demons, a reunion for former Granite Falls High School students and teachers, took place on Saturday, May 14th at the Caldwell County Fairgrounds on Hwy 321 in Lenoir. Established by the late George Keller (class of 1967) in 2014, DWTD had become an annual event until cancelled in 2020 and 2021 due to COVID. Organizers counted 99 persons present - about half the usual number.



HISTORY IN THE MAKING Saying "Good-Bye" to COVID-19

COVID continued lingering during May 2022 in Caldwell County, but the community level remained low per CDC guidelines. The illustration on the right is a screenshot made of the website on May 21, 2022. As of May 19th, the CDC considered 75.81% of the counties in the United States to be low level, 14.98% were medium level, and 9.21% were high level.

Local Medical/Dental Practices: Some, but not all, medical and dental facilities in our area dropped mask mandates.

COVID Tests: On May 21st, the U. S. Government announced that residents could obtain a third set of 8 free COVID tests by ordering online (www.covid.gov/tests).

Vaccines: On May 19, 2022, the CDC announced that children ages 5 and older could have booster shots five (5) months after their first Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine. The agency also recommended that immunocompromised children ages 12 and up and adults 50 and older receive a second booster dose at least four (4) months after their first.

UPDATES **Granite Falls Historical Association**

The Association Board of Trustees held an informal work session on Tuesday, May 17th to look at ways to proceed with the mapping of Pinecrest Cemetery. After reviewing records already collected by Tommy High, they realized they could transfer his data to a map and not have to walk the entire cemetery. Jeanne Whisnant volunteered to obtain a copy of the map on file at the Register of Deeds office and have it enlarged. The next meeting to discuss the project will be Tuesday, June 21st at 2:45 p.m.

Trustees also heard a report from Linda Crowder and Jeanne Whisnant about the Baird Cemetery, which had become overgrown with small trees and vines. The owner recently gave the Historical Association her permission to clean it up. Joel Kaufman began the process by spraying weed killer. Then on May 12th, Joel, Jeanne, and

Linda began removing the weeds and cutting down the trees. Members will hold another work day in the near future to complete the project.

In other business, GFHA trustees decided to cancel the “practice” tea party planned for May 21st. Not only did some of the planners have scheduling conflicts, but they realized it would be better to wait until the two cemetery projects no longer competed for their free time. The tea party will stay on the agenda for future consideration.

At the Museum

The Granite Falls History and Transportation Museum will feature vintage clothing during the month of June. Items will include apparel for women, men, and children.

On July 17th, the History Committee will celebrate the birth of Andrew Baird by serving cupcakes and drinks to museum visitors between 2 and 4 pm. Born in New Jersey on July 18, 1762, he made his way to North Carolina and applied for a land grant on December 11,

1792 so he could set up an iron forge on Gunpowder Creek using the power of the falls that gave our town its name. Baird purchased additional land that would include all of Granite Falls, most of Grace Chapel, and part of Rhodhiss. His former home, now the Granite Falls History and Transportation Museum, is open on Sundays (except holiday weekends) from 2 until 4 p.m. and at other times by appointment.
