MAKING HISTORY COVID-19

As COVID-19 cases rose, Governor Roy Cooper continued to encourage people to get vaccinated and to wear masks indoors. On September 21st, he publicly asked faith leaders to educate their congregants about COVID vaccines and to encourage them to be vaccinated. In addition, he asked each leader to be a “vaccine ambassador” by personally reassuring people that vaccines are safe and effective. The governor also expressed a desire for every house of worship to serve as a vaccination site.

On the Federal level, President Joe Biden reversed his earlier stance against vaccine mandates. On August 18th, he ordered the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) to require nursing homes that receive Medicare and/or Medicaid funding to require staff to be vaccinated. On September 9th, he revised the orders to include all healthcare providers that receive Medicare and/or Medicaid funding. He also ordered the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) to issue an Emergency Temporary Standard (ETS) mandating that all businesses with 100 or more employees require workers to be vaccinated or submit to weekly COVID

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HONORING OUR HEROES Back the Blue Ride 2021 and Remembering 9/11

Area residents honored our local heroes with two parades from Hickory to Lenoir. On Saturday, August 28th, Back the Blue from Caldwell sponsored a ride to honor law enforcement officers. On Saturday, September 11th, local emergency services personnel observed the 20th Anniversary of 9/11.

The Back the Blue Ride began at Xcel Fitness on Clement Boulevard in Hickory and traveled via Hwy 321 and Hwy 321A to the Caldwell County Fairgrounds, where there was an after party that featured food trucks and live entertainment. Funds raised during the event

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testing. In addition, the President required all federal workers to be vaccinated as well as persons working for federal contractors. These orders face numerous legal challenges from states, businesses, and other organizations.

Booster Shots: The Biden Administration had set September 20th as the date to begin booster shots to persons who received either the Pfizer or Moderna vaccine at least six months ago, but the FDA was still reviewing the research data. On September 24th, the FDA approved a request from Pfizer to administer booster shots to persons 65 and older and to adults ages 18 to 64 if they have compromised immunity or live/work in high risk places. The FDA has not ruled on a request by Moderna to administer booster shots. These shots would come six months after the second shot. Meanwhile, persons who are fully vaccinated with either Pfizer or Moderna can still receive a third shot if their immune systems are compromised.

Schools: Dudley Shoals Elementary School suspended in-person learning and went remote the week after the Labor Day Holiday (September 7th - September 10th) due to absences from COVID-19. They resumed normal classes on September 13th. The school system also cancelled high school football games scheduled for August 20 due to the virus.

Caldwell's Response to Rising COVID cases: With COVID cases overwhelming its emergency room and urgent care centers, Caldwell Memorial Hospital reopened its drive-thru respiratory diagnostic clinic (RDC) near Walmart in Granite Falls on September 13th. Until further notice, the unit will operate from 8 a.m. until 4 p.m. on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays. Persons wishing to be tested just need to get line when the unit is open. They do not need a referral or an appointment. The RDC had closed in March 2021 after a year of service.



CLOSED FOR REPAIRS *North Highland Avenue*

On Monday, September 13, 2021, the North Carolina Department of Transportation closed North Highland Avenue to through traffic in order to replace the Billy Branch culvert that was damaged by heavy rains on Thursday, November 11, 2020. The road was closed until Tuesday, December 15, 2020 while the DOT made temporary repairs. Officials expect the permanent fix to be ready around October 9, 2021. In the meantime, motorists will detour via Pinewood Road and Hwy 321A or by way of Hwy 321 and Archer Street/Falls Avenue.

HELP WANTED *Must Have a Burning Desire To Help Others*



The Granite Falls Fire Department is accepting applications for volunteer fire fighters. The Town of Granite Falls hired its first law enforcement officer during the first meeting of the Town Council in 1899. At the time, the town constable was responsible for tax collection, street maintenance, and oversight of the cemetery. In 1916, the council added two more duties - lighting the street lights and winding the clock in the park. As the town grew, other departments took on these duties so police could deal with actual crimes, civil complaints, traffic violations, etc. Today's police officers face myriad challenges and a complicated legal system. NC DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE *Help with Food, Rent, and Utilities*

Low income residents of Granite Falls who need help paying for food, utilities, and rent may be eligible for financial assistance from a Community Development Block Grant - Coronavirus Program (CDBG-CV) awarded to the Town of Granite Falls and South Caldwell Christian Ministries (SCCM). Western Piedmont Council of Governments assisted the town and the ministry in the application process. SCCM will administer the program. Qualified persons must live within the city limits, have an open utility account with the town, and meet the low income requirements for fiscal year 2021 set by the Federal Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

Persons who believe they qualify for assistance should call (828) 396-4000 for an appointment. Applicants must prove that they live in Granite Falls, meet the income restrictions, and show copies of past due utility and/or rent statements. Someone at SCCM will be available to assist applicants under the following schedule: Tuesdays and Thursdays from 9:00 a.m. until 12:15 p.m. and 1:30 p.m. until 4:30 p.m. and on Wednesdays from 9:00 a.m. until 11:30 a.m. and from 12:30 p.m. until 2:00 p.m.
